wenty years ago, Teresa Alvarado was a new mother at the age of 16 who found herself lost in the foster care system. After several failed foster care placements, where she felt families were more interested in her son than caring for her, she became a resident at St. Anne's, a ministry dedicated to serving women, children, and families in need since 1908.

At St. Anne's, located in Los Angeles, CA, Teresa found stable housing and childcare that allowed her to maintain gainful employment. Through the St. Anne's Workforce Development Program, Teresa was also connected with a mentor who provided her with opportunities to learn valuable job skills in accounting, human resources, and development.

Those skills were put to good use when Teresa was hired as a full-time Family Advocate at St. Anne's in 2018. Today, she is a homeowner and is currently working toward her degree in social work.



Teresa is one of many women served by St. Anne's, an organization that recently took the name St. Anne's Family Services to better represent the broad scope of their work. They now offer transitional and permanent supportive housing, early childhood education centers, mental health services, wraparound services, a workforce development program, parenting skills workshops, and additional programs, all in an environment that exudes compassion and respect for the dignity of all persons.

Doing More to Prevent Homelessness

Felician Sisters of North America Provide Seed Grant to Establish Eviction Prevention Fund

ven in the best of times, many families in the United States are just one paycheck away Ifrom homelessness. Now, in the midst of a pandemic, when businesses are forced to close, and unemployment is higher than its been since the Great Depression, even more families are facing the possibility of homelessness. In fact, Columbia economics professor Brendan O'Flaherty projects that another 250,000 people could find themselves homeless in the next year, an increase of 40-45%



The Felician Sisters of North America have seen the impact of homelessness through the work of their Sisters and ministries. With the threat of an end to the federal moratorium on evictions looming from month to month, they asked themselves "What more can we do?"

"In these uncertain times, we know that many families are suffering the burden of unemployment and food insecurity," said Sr. Mary Christopher Moore, Provincial Minister. "It is unconscionable that families should also face the fear of losing their homes."

Knowing that Catholic Charities USA (CCUSA) had a system in place for the quick distribution of emergency funding to their agencies across the country, the Felician Sisters reached out to them to collaborate on the establishment of an eviction prevention fund. Within severals weeks, the Francis Fund for Eviction Prevention was created and more than \$100,000 had been distributed to those in danger of losing their homes.

In addition to this fund, eight of our Felician ministries provide affordable housing or services to those experiencing homelessness.







Felician Sisters of North America 2020 Year in Review

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Bakery Dream Springs Hope

Jobs, Education, and Economic Growth

In 2012, two Felician Sisters arrived in Haiti to begin a ministry of presence when a young child knocked on their door saying, "Mwen grangou" — "I am hungry". With only a few granola bars in their backpacks, Sisters Marilyn Marie Minter and Mary Inga Borko started feeding hungry children at their front door. More than eight years later, Felician Mission: Haiti has fed, educated, and provided spiritual guidance to hundreds of children who are now young adults in need of higher education, job skills, and employment opportunities in order to be self-sufficient. The Sisters knew they needed to do more.

Dr. Jean-Paul Bonnet, a long-time friend and supporter of the Felician Sisters shared in their dream of building a bakery to provide sustainability for the people of the Diocese of Jacmel. A bakery may sound like a luxury, but a bakery in Jacmel could be a lifeline. Instead of decorative cupcakes and pastries, this bakery will make bread — a luxury in Haiti, where 30% of the population is food insecure.

Modeled after a similar bakery in Les Cayes — a four hour drive from Jacmel — the bakery will also provide opportunities for job training and employment, especially for Haitian mothers.

The Les Cayes bakery produces approximately 1,600 dozen rolls per day which are given to women called "retailers" who then sell them. In addition to providing these women with a source of income, the Sisters who operate the bakery also provide them with tuition for one of their children to attend school. They now employ about 40 such retailers.

After years of planning and meetings, the Sisters acquired a piece of land from the Jacmel diocese. The land is now being prepared for construction. For the bakery to work, access to clean water is necessary — a true luxury when most Haitians must walk several miles to the nearest well. To access water, Dr. Bonnet is collaborating with Water for Life,

a non-profit organization that has drilled more than 1,800 wells in Haiti and will also dig wells for *Felician Mission: Haiti* and a nearby school.

Construction will take some time, but the Sisters at Felician Mission: Haiti are beginning to identify women who will be a good fit to train and work in the bakery. More than half of the households in Haiti are supported by women, so the creation of opportunities for mothers to care for their families is a priority. When two of every three Haitians do not have steady work, job creation is essential.

While the construction of the bakery has been delayed by political uprising, Dr. Bonnet is hopeful that it will begin this summer. Sr. Marilyn said, "Praise the Lord! We are getting closer to fulfilling our dream of creating jobs through accompaniment, relationships, and empowerment!"

Rebuilding Haiti, One Student at a Time

ean Hubert Romain was just a young man when he lost his mother in the devastating earthquake that hit Haiti in 2010, killing nearly 95,000 Haitians. Trying to find a way to support himself and his siblings, he met Dr. Jean-Paul Bonnet, who had come to Haiti to provide emergency healthcare. Dr. Bonnet put Hubert in charge of the maintenance of "Santé Bus," vehicles used as makeshift mobile clinics, a job Hubert performed meticulously.

The same year, the Felician Sisters sent a team to assess the needs and determine the best way to assist the people in recovering. The decision was made to establish a mission in Haiti, but Sr. Mary Christopher Moore, provincial minister, wanting to do more, reached out to Sr. Rose Marie Kujawa, then president of Feliciansponsored Madonna University, with a plan to provide opportunities for higher education in Haiti.

In 2011, Madonna University launched the *Haitian Education Leadership Program*, a three-year online bachelor's degree program in Business Administration. The only program of its kind in Haiti, it would provide Haitians an opportunity for higher education, to help them become leaders in their communities.

Dr. Bonnet learned of the program, and recognizing Hubert's potential, encouraged him to enroll. Hubert



became one of the first to graduate from the online university and is now putting his bachelor's degree to good use.

Hubert is overseeing a project close to the hearts of Dr. Bonnet and the Felician Sisters — the construction of a bakery that will provide the community with job training, employment opportunities, and a food source. In addition to working with the engineers and architects on the design of the building, Hubert is helping to create the business plan.

With average Haitian salaries ranging from \$200 - \$600 per year, Madonna University and the Felician Sisters of North America committed to making the program accessible. The cost of tuition per year is nearly \$28,000, but the Haitian students pay only \$500 per semester. The rest is covered by donors and with support funds from the university and the Felician Sisters.

H.E.L.P. continues to evolve to meet the needs of Haitian students. English as a second language, leadership training, and a community volunteer project have recently been added. The result is an ever-growing list of Madonna alumni located in Haiti who are rebuilding their country.
